If ever there has been a chance for SubVets to live up to our motto it is now. "To perpetuate the memory of those shipmates who gave their lives in submarine warfare" on the first submarine that proved the capability to sink another war vessel is a golden opportunity for any of our brothers who are interested.

We need volunteers who can greet visitors to the Hunley Museum as well as cash register clerks for the gift shop and speakers to the public on a variety of topics related to the Hunley submarine. We have flexibility and would welcome our SubVet brothers to start in one billet and advance to the next if that is your preference.

Some of the "perks" are;

1. After a year of service a volunteer's membership to the Friends of the Hunley Organization is free and will continue for as long as you are actively engaged in the Volunteer Program. Membership provides quarterly updates from Warren Lasch Conservation Laboratory by a periodical named "The Blue Light".

2. Uniform shirts and nametags are provided and SubVets are encouraged to wear vests when volunteering.

3. Volunteers receive two tickets to the annual Oyster Roast which normally costs \$55.00 per person for the general public.

4. Volunteers get 40% off in the gift shop.

5. Volunteers have access to our Membership Behind the Scenes tours at no cost. The public requires paid membership to be invited.

6. Quarterly Lecture Series and Scientific Updates are provided for the Volunteer Team by the Conservation and Archaeological teams who work at Warren Lasch Conservation Lab.

The museum is open to the public on weekends, and you can expect to be volunteering

either Saturday or Sunday (or both) mornings or afternoons. There are also private tours during the weekdays, and you can choose to work one or more of those. At the same time, it's a volunteer job so nobody expects you to be there unless you want it. I have been volunteering at the museum for almost a year and it's been a great experience. I have met with several SubVets from other bases and met people from all over who share our interest in submarines, technology and the crewmen that man them.

If you have an interest in considering the opportunity, we would be happy to organize a behind-the-scenes tour for you. In fact, if the entire SubVet Charleston Base is interested we would be pleased to arrange the tour, at no charge.

Australia's nuclear-powered submarines

Virginia Class submarines

The United States intends to sell Australia 3 Virginia Class SSNs (nuclear-powered submarines) from as soon as the early 2030s, subject to US Congressional approval. There will also be the potential to sell up to 2 more if needed.

The SSN Virginia Class will provide Australia a nuclear-powered submarine capability as early as possible.

This acquisition will eliminate any capability gap and increase the 3 nations (Australia, UK and US) ability to deter aggression and contribute to peace and stability in the Indo-Pacific.

SSN-AUKUS

Australia's nuclear-powered submarines - SSN -AUKUS - will be based on the UK's next generation design that incorporates technology from all 3 nations, including cutting edge US submarine technologies.

The combination of technology from all 3 partners will deliver a world-class submarine that meets Australia's long-term defence needs while bolstering trilateral industrial cooperation. SSN-AUKUS will incorporate US technology, such as propulsion plant systems and components, a common vertical launch system and weapons. The AUKUS partners will also develop a joint combat system as an expansion of the US-Australia combat system.

The UK will commence construction of its first SSN-AUKUS in Barrow-in-Furness UK, as early as the late 2020s. The UK intends to deliver its first SSN-AUKUS to the UK Royal Navy in the late 2030s.

Australia will begin building its first SSN-AUKUS in Adelaide South Australia, by the end of this decade. Australia plans to deliver the first Australian-built SSN-AUKUS to the Royal Australian Navy in the early 2040s.

Australia will begin enabling works this year at the future submarine construction yard in Osborne South Australia.

As a trilateral endeavour, SSN-AUKUS provides maximum interoperability among AUKUS partners. It will elevate all 3 nations' industrial capacity to produce and sustain advanced and interoperable SSNs for decades to come.


SSN-AUKUS will be operated by both the UK and Australian Navies, and will be equipped for intelligence, surveillance, under-sea warfare and strike missions.

SSN-AUKUS will be a state-of-the-art platform designed to leverage the best submarine technology of all 3 AUKUS partners. It will enhance the ability of our 3 nations to deter aggression and contribute to stability in the Indo-Pacific and globally.

Bourbon Raffle

Up for raffle by the Admiral James B. Osborne Memorial Scholarship Committee is a bottle of currently limited release bourbon. **APRIL ONE** embodies strength, character, and excellence. The rank was officially established 1 April 1893, when the rank "petty officer first class" was shifted to "chief petty officer." This originally encompassed nine ratings: chief master-at-arms, chief boatswain's mate, chief quartermaster, chief gunner's mate, chief machinist, chief carpenter's mate, chief yeoman, apothecary, and band master. Chief petty officer could be either an acting (temporary) appointment, designated as AA, or a permanent appointment, designated as PA. The Career Compensation Act of 1949 created an E-7 grade that standardized pay for all chief petty officers, regardless of acting or permanent status. Acting status for chief petty officers was not eliminated until 1965.

· Highlighted boat of the month:

o Gudgeon was probably lost on April 18, 19444 with the loss of 79 men SE of Iwo Jima, but may have been sunk no May 12, 1944 in another attack on an unidentified submarine and heard by several other submarines in the area. Winner of 5 Presidential Unit Citations, Gudgeon was on her 12th war patrol and most likely sunk due to a combined air and surface antisubmarine attack. Gudgeon was the first US submarine to go on patrol from Pearl Harbor after the Japanese attack. On her first patrol, she became the first US submarine to sink an enemy warship, picking off the submarine I-173.

· I want to thank Tom Lawson for taking care of Chaplain/Webmaster duties in March.

• There are several shipmates and family members who have given me information which they wish to be kept confidential at this time.

• This shipmate was a neighbor of our secretary who provided me with this information: MMCM (SS) Dweight Gordon "Mac" McDowell, USN Retired, 72, departed on Eternal Patrol on February 17 at home. Mac joined the Navy in November 1969 and retired in October 1990. He attended various Navy schools including Navy Nuclear Power School in Schenectady, NY; graduating in 1974 and gualified submarines in 1975. Although this list is incomplete, Mac served aboard USS SUNFISH SSN-649, leaving for shore duty in 1984. He spent his last two years of submarine duty aboard USS BENJAMIN FRANKLIN SSBN-640 immediately prior to his retirement. He had been qualified as Nuclear Plant Supervisor for more than twelve years and received numerous awards. You could always find him in his garage working on a carpentry project for someone. He spent his leisure time fishing. A note of condolence from Charleston Base was placed on the funeral home website. He was not a member of Charleston Base.
