Sea Stories Wanted!

I want your sea stories to publish in the Newsletter. We all have stories to tell and the base should hear them. I'll start with one of mine.

My first day "at sea"

After prototype in Idaho Falls, I had orders to the USS John Adams, SSBN-620B in May 1979 as a whiney ass third class MM ELT nub. I checked in to Group 6 Charleston on my last day of leave. The COB and the XO were the only two in the office. The COB told me we were flying to Holy Loch the next day, to get my crap together, get a haircut, get my car stowed away and muster the next morning 0800 sharp.

0800, I was in the muster line with no idea who my chief was or anyone in M-Div. We were flying on Evergreen Airlines on their maiden flight overseas. While siting on the tarmac in Charleston, there was a failure that required us to pull back in and replace a fuel filter. That took two hours while we sat on the plane. No alcohol was allowed while we waited.

Finally we were off and after a couple of hours into the flight, the pilot announced we had to land at McGuire AFB in New Jersey because the Evergreen navigator didn't have overseas charts.

Charts in hand, we were off again. About a hour later the pilot announced they would have to land at Loring AFB in Maine. The navigator, now with charts, determined we didn't have enough fuel to make Scotland. We sat on the tarmac in Maine for over an hour when our Captain announced that Evergreen Airlines did not have a contract with Loring AFB and couldn't buy fuel. The Captain spoke with Group 6, paid for fuel with his checking account and was later reimbursed. So off we go again. By this time many of us were drunk or wanted to be.

Amazingly, we finally made it to Scotland. I had to hit the head in the airport so my chief told me where to meet the buses to Holy Loch. I hopped one of the buses, didn't see M-Div but figured it was other Adams sailors and stayed. About five minutes later someone asked me where I thought I was going. I stated I was headed to Holy Loch. He said this was a liberty bus headed through the channel tunnel to France. Got off that bus just in time and found my bus. No more drama and the bus made it safely to Holy Loch.

BTW, that COB was QMCM/SS Buzz Bright. The best COB I had in my 20 years.

Survivor Benefit Plan changes

There is a once in a lifetime opportunity to change your Survivors Benefit (SBP) coverage. Either starting it or stopping it. See <u>SBP Open Season</u> for details.

What's going on in Washington?

Potential rising costs for Tricare and Tricare for Life (TFL)

The Congressional Budget Office testified before the Senate Armed Services Subcommittee recently requesting the reduction of the DOD's compensation costs.

Among the requested changes were:

- 1. A new TFL annual enrollment fee of \$575 for individuals/\$1,150 for families
- 2. TFL members to pay the first \$850 of their medical costs and 50% of the next \$7,650 in costs annually
- 3. Tricare Prime fees to increase to \$650 for individuals/\$1,300 family annually
- 4. Tricare Select fees to increase to \$485 for individuals/\$970 family annually

The subcommittee has not created a bill at this point. This represents a large increase in costs for veterans and a potential impact for those sailors deciding to stay for full retirement. Congress keeps chipping away at retirement benefits

GUARD VA Benefits Act

The Governing Unaccredited Representatives Defrauding VA Benefits Act (H.R. 1139, S.740)

Many unaccredited claims reps assist with your VA benefits and rights and in many cases charge veterans for services that would be free if contacting the VA directly. These reps also make claims about services that do not exist or misrepresent services.

Multiple States Attorneys sent a letter to Congress urging the passage of this bill. This bill will add penalties to companies that use fraudulent claims to assist with your VA benefits and rights.


To fund or not to fund

% of members with previous military service -





o USS CISCO SS-290 departed on her 1st war patrol, but never returned. Japanese records tell of sighting a submarine leaking oil in the area where the Cisco was known to have been on duty. Japanese records state she was sunk by bombs and depth charges with the loss of 76 men.

□ There are several shipmates and family members who have given me information which they wish to be kept confidential at this time.

ENCS(SS) Kenneth Carroll Henry (Pig Pen or The Pigger) of the Sailor's Home in Gulfport MS has departed on Eternal Patrol on August 27, 2023. Ken joined the Navy in 1956 and retired in 1974. He qualified on TRUTTA SS-421 in 1957. He was on ARCHERFISH SS-311 during her time in LANTFLT mapping the sea floor so the Boomers of the future could sail undeterred. Ken also served on GUAVINA SS-362, TENCH SS-417, EN-TEMEDOR SS-340 and TUSK SS-426. After retiring from the Navy, he became a volunteer Fireman in Fla. After his wife's death Pigger moved to the Sailor's Home. More importantly he became the history keeper of SubVets WWII, researching and reporting Eternal Patrol notices of those heroes who rode real submarines during that conflict referred to as WWII. If Pigger was called and asked about a WWII Boat Sailor, he would email back with a history, naming the boats, War patrols, when & why change of rank (both directions), etc. A Class Act that never will be repeated. Non-Nuclear Historian – Harry Nettles

□ This will relate to anyone who has ever been a member of a Man Overboard Party, a Leading Seaman (Yes, I realize that Nukes will not understand this one), a Deck Division LPO or possibly a Torpedoman.

□ His name was LTJG Colch. He was a Rescue Pilot in Korea flying helicopters. How many Machinist Mates do we have in here tonight? How about a MM for a crewman aboard a helicopter. This man created the "Horse Collar" which is used to rescue downed pilots. So, if you were a First Lieutenant, Deck Division LPO or anyone who has ever been on a Man Overboard Party, you are familiar with a horse collar. In his spare time, while he was deployed to Korea, he created other safety devices to help with the rescue of downed pilots. On July 3,1951, LT Colch and his crewman, while attempting to rescue a downed pilot in Korea, were shot down. For three days, they evaded capture, living off of one candy bar, two canteens of water and a flask of brandy. Eventually, they were captured. Both were wounded, both were hungry and suffering from

exposure. LT Colch defied his captors. He would not answer their questions. He was a POW demanding proper treatment, of which, he and his crewman did not get. He shared meager rations with other POWs and gave only his name, rank and serial number. He had resolve which enabled him to survive the abuse that suffered at the hands of his captors. However, his body was not strong and on October 16, 1951, LT Colch succumbed to his injuries and died as a POW. His actions resulted in the development of the Code of Conduct. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his heroism as a POW.

 \Box Please Stand.

□ The Code of Conduct

o I am an American, fighting in the forces which guard my country and our way of life. I am prepared to give my life in their defense.

o I will never surrender of my own free will. If in command, I will never surrender the members of my command while they still have the means to resist.

o If I am captured I will continue to resist by all means available. I will make every effort to escape and aid others to escape. I will accept neither parole nor special favors from the enemy.

o If I become a prisoner of war, I will keep faith with my fellow prisoners. I will give no information or take part in any action which might be harmful to my comrades. If I am senior, I will take command. If not, I will obey the lawful orders of those appointed over me and will back them up in every way. o When questioned, should I become a prisoner of war, I am required to give name, rank, service number and date of birth. I will evade answering all further questions to the utmost of my ability. I will make no oral or written statements disloyal to my country and its allies or harmful to their cause.

o I will never forget that I am an American, fighting for freedom, responsible for my actions, and dedicated to the principles which made my country free. I will trust in my God and in the United States of America.
