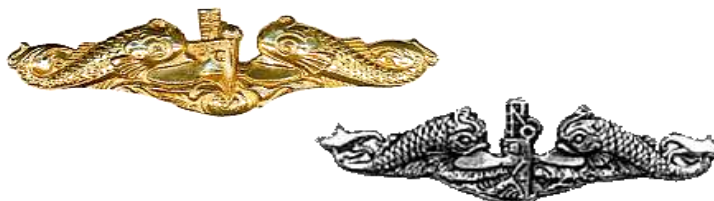

IMPORTANT DATES

US NAVY BIRTHDAY 13 October

A 13 October 1775 resolution of the Continental Congress established what is now the United States Navy with “a swift sailing vessel, to carry ten carriage guns, and a proportionable number of swivels, with eighty men, be fitted, with all possible despatch, for a cruise of three months....” After the American War of Independence, the U.S. Constitution empowered the new Congress “to provide and maintain a navy.” Acting on this authority, Congress established the Department of the Navy on 30 April 1798.

In 1972, Chief of Naval Operations Admiral Elmo R. Zumwalt authorized official recognition of 13 October as the birthday of the U.S. Navy. Since then, each CNO has encouraged a Navy-wide celebration of this occasion “to enhance a greater appreciation of our Navy heritage, and to provide a positive influence toward pride and professionalism in the naval service.” 13 October 2024 will mark the Navy's 249th birthday.



IMPORTANT DATES

DAY OF THE DEPLOYED

26 October

Day of the Deployed is a day to honor our deployed troops and their families for their bravery and the sacrifices they are making for our country.

Supporters of the military are urged to get personally involved in activities that send care packages, offer messages of encouragement, and other morale-boosting activities to those currently deployed overseas and the military families of the deployed.

Over the years, John Hoeven moved on from being a governor to a career as a North Dakota State Senator, and in 2011 he led an effort to establish official recognition for the holiday. On Oct. 18, 2011, his resolution passed unanimously for the first Day Of The Deployed. The Senate resolution is passed anew each year.

In a press release issued by the Senator's office that first announced the measure, Hoeven said, "Our U.S. service men and women currently deployed, along with their loved ones, make untold sacrifices as they serve our nation...A national Day of the Deployed pays tribute to their commitment to our country and their work to protect our freedoms."



IMPORTANT DATES

NAVY DAY

27 October

What is the difference between Navy Day and the Navy Birthday? Both occur in the month of October, and both celebrate the men and women of the United States Navy, past and present. The Navy celebrates its birthday officially on Oct. 13, and Navy Day was established to be observed on Oct. 27.

This year Navy Day will be on Tuesday, Oct. 27, 2026.

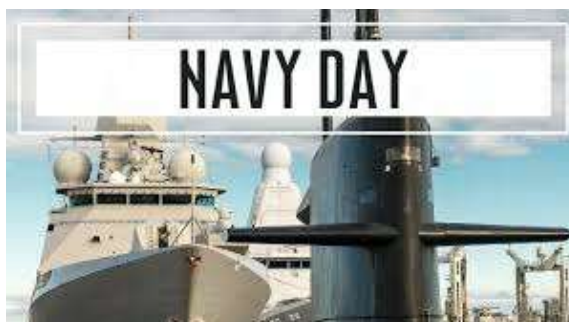
There are plenty of differences between the two, starting with the fact that the Navy Birthday is recognized on the anniversary of the historical formation of the Continental Navy during the American Revolution. Navy Day was originally chosen to coincide with the birthday of President Theodore Roosevelt.

Navy Day is actually the older observance, in terms of when it was created and officially recognized as it is today. The “official” observation of the Navy birthday was initiated by Admiral Elmo Zumwalt in 1972, but Navy Day was sponsored by the Navy League of New York in 1922.

While both holidays recognize the service and sacrifices of those in uniform, Navy Day is specifically about military service, where the Navy birthday celebrates the origins and history of the U.S. Navy.

Navy Day isn't unique to the American military. Many countries worldwide celebrate their own versions on different dates and with different traditions. Russia, Turkey, Pakistan, the United Kingdom, India, Croatia, Mexico, and many other nations all hold their own observations.

Editor's Note: While this list may not be complete, a web search, along with a search of our base website found these former submariners interned here

- RADM Herman Joseph Kossler – A highly decorated Rear Admiral who commanded the USS Cavalla (SS-244) during World War II. He was awarded the Navy Cross for his heroism in sinking a 29,000-ton Japanese aircraft carrier and surviving a relentless 106-depth-charge attack
- RADM James B. Osborn – Highly decorated Rear Admiral who commanded the USS Tunny (SSG-282), the first U.S. nuclear bomb-carrying guided missile submarine, from which the first Regulus missile was launched off Point Mugu, Calif., in July 1953. He also commanded the USS George Washington (SSBN598) Blue, the first U.S. Polaris ballistic missile submarine. Charleston Base.
- CDR Michael J. Showers – A 23-year Navy veteran who served aboard the USS Patrick Henry (SSBN-599), USS Seadragon (SSN-584), and USS Robert E. Lee (SSBN-601). He later served as the Commanding Officer of the USS Henry L. Stimson (SSBN-655)
- Howard Allen Gniffke, CPO(SS) – Served 21 years in the U.S. Navy, including his deployment aboard the USS Ulysses S. Grant (SSBN-631) from 1973 to 1975
- Thomas Lawson, Jr. – A Cold War submarine veteran and a dedicated Life Member of the SUBVETS USSVI National and Charleston Base
- Irving "Knute" Knudson, Jr. – A World War II veteran who served beneath the waves aboard the USS Atule (SS-403) submarine
- Lawrence Albert "Buddy" Green – A Cold War submarine veteran who transitioned into the Navy at the tail end of WWII after a stint in the Merchant Marine. He is buried in the historic section of the cemetery
- Emmett Leroy "Lee" Rackley, MSC – Served his country continuously in the submarine service from 1958 until his retirement in 1989. Charleston Base
- Charles Edward Horton – Honorably discharged after completing a four-year service rotation aboard a nuclear submarine
- CWO4 Jerry K. Stout served on the USS Cavalla (SSN-684), USS Barb (SSN-596), USS Honolulu (SSN-718) and the USS Holland (AS-32). Charleston Base

- QM1(SS) Walter James Curtis served in the US Navy during WWII and the Korean War. He was a member of the US Submarine Veterans of WWII, US Submarine Veterans, Charleston Base and US Submarine Veterans, Weeki Wachee Base
- CWO1(SS) Charles Clifford 'Chuck' Bohling served on the USS Argonaut (SS-475), the USS Cubera (SS-347) and the USS Simon Bolivar (SSN-641). He was a member of Navy Seal Team 2 during his service in Vietnam. Charleston Base
- MMCM(SS) Glenn Francis Fleming served on the USS Skate (SSN-578), the USS Snook (SSN-592), the USS Charr (SS-328), the USS Barb (SSN-596), the USS Sam Houston (SSBN/SSN-609) and the USS James Madison (SSBN-627). Charleston Base
- MMC(SS) Karl Edwin Humbertson served on seven diesel submarines and four SSBN's. Along with being a member of Charleston Base, he was also a member of Hammerton Lodge #332, Scottish Rite of Free Masonry, Omar Temple, Dorchester Shrine Club, American Legion Post 166, VFW Post 10624, FRA Branch 269, and DAV Chapter 17
- LT(SS) Clyde V. Peters served on the USS Pollack (SSN-603), the USS Spadefish (SSN-668), the USS Sunfish (SSN649), the US Jack SSN-605) and the USS James Madison (SSBN-627). Charleston Base
- EMC(SS) William 'Bill' E. Pruitt. Doesn't list his submarines. Charleston Base
- CDR(SS) Albert Aloysius Wood Jr. member of the Swamp Fox Chapter and the Charleston Base chapters
- LCDR(SS) James Warren Eckles served in US Navy Submarine Service for 30 years on 9 different submarines His first submarine USS COCHINO (SS345) sank in the North Atlantic on the 26th of August 1949 which was the beginning of the cold war. Charleston Base
- TMC(SS) Robert 'Bob' Duane Finch member of The Charleston Base and VFW Post #3433

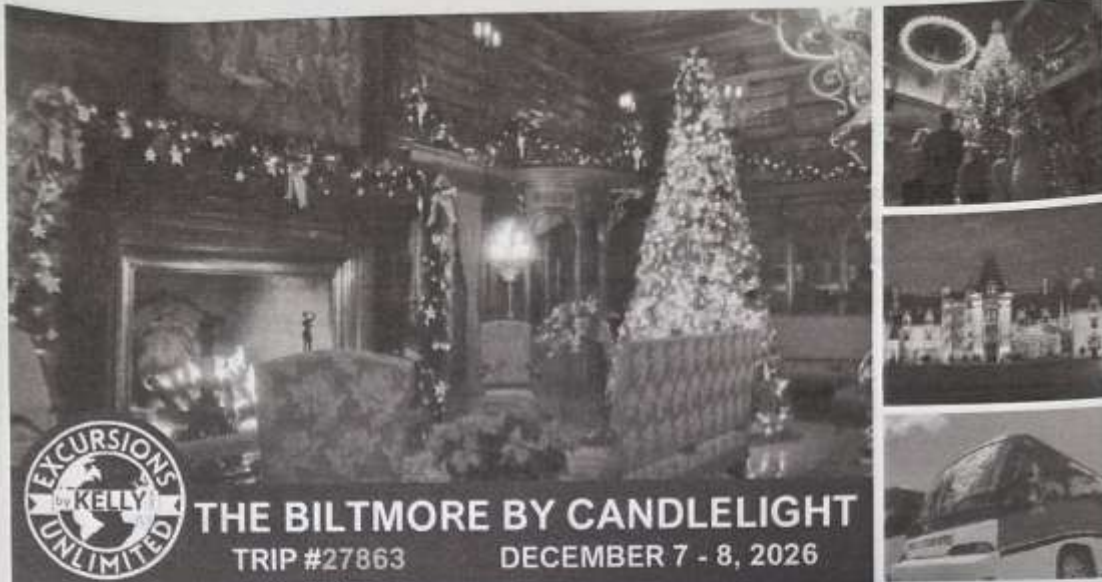

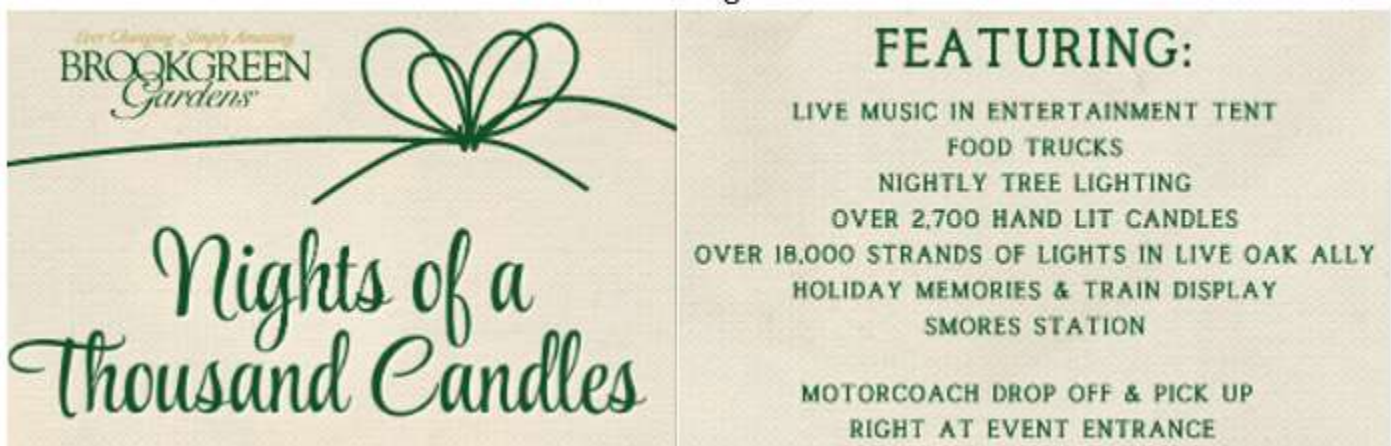
Group rate is \$34/ticket, minimum 20 tickets.

A new exhibit at the Charleston Museum offers a personal glimpse into men aboard the Hunley

CHARLESTON — More than a century underwater did little to erase one man's final footprint.

The sole of a shoe recovered and conserved from the H.L. Hunley still bears the indentation of the foot that once filled it, offering a remarkably intimate glimpse of one of the eight men who disappeared aboard the historic submarine in 1864.

The shoe — and artifacts like it — will be the centerpiece of a new exhibit at the Charleston Museum that focuses on sailors who died that day and what they left behind.

The Charleston Museum will open "Textiles from the Deep: Findings from the H.L. Hunley Submarine" on Oct. 3 in its Historic Textiles Gallery. The exhibit, presented in partnership with the Friends of the Hunley and Clemson University's Warren Lasch Conservation Center, will feature conserved textile remnants and an array of items recovered from the submarine.

The H.L. Hunley made history on Feb. 17, 1864, when it became the first successful combat submarine in world history after sinking the USS Housatonic off the coast of Charleston. The submarine disappeared after the mission and remained lost at sea for more than a century. It was discovered in 1995 by the National Underwater and Marine Agency and was recovered off the Charleston coast in 2000.

Excavation of the Hunley's interior began in early 2001. The human remains were removed and interred at Magnolia Cemetery.

Among the artifacts on display will be a silk bandana worn around the neck of one of the men and a brass oil can. Many of them were retrieved from the wreckage after it was pulled from the Atlantic.

"Each item offers a rare glimpse into the lives of the Hunley's eight-man crew, a story of innovation and loss," said Virginia Theerman, curator of historic textiles at The Charleston Museum.

The artifacts have undergone years of painstaking conservation.

Scientists at Clemson's Warren Lasch Conservation Center have worked with the Friends of the Hunley for the past 26 years to conserve the submarine and study the men who were aboard during its final voyage. Textile remnants were cleaned while submerged in water and then carefully freeze-dried to stabilize them. Some artifacts offer more mysteries than answers, but marine archaeologists and conservators at the lab spend years meticulously salvaging each one.

Before-and-after conservation images will be displayed to show the treatment process of recovered objects. Theerman said conserving textiles recovered from marine environments is particularly challenging, making the ability to preserve and study the fragile materials significant.

One example is the oil can, which was once covered in layers of concretion and difficult to identify. During conservation, researchers discovered that it still contained oil from the 19th century. The can was found near the captain's station, where it likely was kept close at hand to lubricate the submarine's moving components.

The Hunley was then taken to the conservation center at Clemson's Charleston Innovation Campus in North Charleston, where conservation and research continue. It remains open to the public to view as a museum.

"History can feel distant until something brings you closer to the people who lived it," said Kellen Butler, executive director of Friends of the Hunley. "These remnants of clothing do just that, offering a remarkably personal connection to the men of the Hunley."

Textiles from the Deep: Findings from the H.L. Hunley Submarine will be on display at The Charleston Museum through April 4, 2027.

The outgoing exhibit, "Ringleaders of Rebellion: Charleston in Revolt, 1775—1783," is on display through Sept. 20. It focuses on the Revolutionary War and Charleston's role — from the Battle of Sullivan's Island to the siege and British occupation.

A Busy Submarine Day during WWII

26 October 1944

[USS Drum \(SS-228\)](#): Fired an incredibly effective initial torpedo spread north of Luzon, sinking the passenger-cargo ship **Taisho Maru** (often recorded as *Taishu Maru*) and the cargo ship **Taihaku Maru**. In the same attack, she also sank the transport **Tatsura Maru** and severely damaged the passenger-cargo ship **Aoki Maru**. These vessels were heavily laden with Japanese troops and reinforcements bound for the Philippines.

[USS Icefish \(SS-367\)](#): Successfully torpedoed and sank the Japanese merchant cargo vessel **Taiyo Maru** west of the Luzon Strait. Following the attack, *Icefish* sustained damage from a retaliatory depth-charge barrage by Japanese escort ships, which forced her to cut her patrol short and return to port.

[USS Rock \(SS-274\)](#): Located and sank the Japanese merchant tanker **No. 7 Takasago Maru** near the Balabac Strait, registering the submarine's only official sinking of her wartime career.

During my research into successful WWII submarines, I was surprised to find many official and unofficial sources differ on the number of ships sunk and gross tonnage sunk during WWII by US submarines. To maintain consistency, I am using one main source for information. While there may be discrepancies between sources, one fact is indisputable, US submarines held the line in WWII while the surface fleet rebuilt

Submarine Warfare Played Major Role in World War II Victory

In all, U.S. submarines destroyed 1,314 enemy warships in the Pacific, representing 55% of all Axis power warships lost and a total of 5.3 million tons of shipping

Out of 16,000 U.S. submariners, the force lost 375 officers and 3,131 enlisted men in 52 submarines, and "although this was a tragic loss, it was still the lowest casualty rate of any combatant submarine service on either side in the 1939-1945 conflict," Weir noted. In the final months of the war, American submarines had difficulty finding targets because the Japanese had virtually no ships left to sink.

During World War II, U.S. submarines sank more Japanese ships than did U.S. surface vessels and planes, but at a high cost: a twenty percent casualty rate

8. USS Drum (SS-228) 80,580 tons

- **USS Drum (SS-228)** is a Gato-class submarine of the United States Navy, the first Navy ship named after the drum, a type of fish. Drum is a museum ship in Mobile, Alabama, at Battleship Memorial Park.
- Drum was the twelfth of the Gato class but was the first completed and the first to enter combat in World War II. She is the oldest of her class still in existence.
- Commissioned 1 November 1941
- First war patrol 14 April 1942
- Conducted 14 war patrols
- 12 Battle Stars
- Decommissioned 16 February 1946

7. USS Trigger (SS-237) 86,552 tons

- **USS Trigger (SS-237)** was a Gato-class submarine, the first ship of the United States Navy to be named for the triggerfish
- Commissioned 31 January 1942
- First war patrol 26 June 1942
- Conducted 12 war patrols
- Received a Presidential Citation and 11 Battle Stars
 - *For outstanding performance in combat during her Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh War Patrols against the enemy. Employing highly daring and hazardous tactics, the USS TRIGGER struck at the enemy with consistent aggressiveness, seeking out and pursuing her targets with dogged determination regardless of unfavorable attack conditions. Her exceptionally notable record of severe damage inflicted on hostile shipping and the gallant fighting spirit of her officers and men reflect great credit upon the United States Naval Service*
- Lost with 89 souls on 28 March 1945. [History of her final patrol](#)
- Trigger was immortalized and eulogized in Beach's 1952 book Submarine!
- Destroyer escort USS Connole (DE-1056, later FF-1056) was named in honor of Commander David R. Connole
